Comments

Government Relations and Consultation Activity

The government relations consultation review process was developed in order to provide a centralized way to coordinate and track opportunities for the City to provide input into Federal and Provincial legislative, regulatory, and programming considerations. This process is governed by the Government Relations Consultation Tracking Policy (Policy Number A09 ADM 008).

From January 1 to June 30, 2025, a total of two (2) government relations activities took place (Appendix A).

- Two (2) consultation responses were submitted to the appropriate legislative bodies

External Grant/Funding Application Tracking and Results

From January 1 to June 30, 2025, there were 17 grant/funding applications tracked through the Employee Grant Application Database (Appendix B).

- Three (3) were successful (totaling \$11.8M)
 - Housing Enabling Core Servicing (HECS)
 - Seniors Active Living Centres Program (2025-2026)
 - Seniors Active Living Fair Funding (2024-2025)
- Two (2) were unsuccessful
- Six (6) are in progress (waiting for funding decision)
- Three (3) are being actively reviewed currently

- Three (3) were reviewed and not eligible (could not meet eligibility criteria or there were no City projects identified that met the grant objectives and/or timelines)

There are many factors that affect external funding decisions, including the number of applications received relative to the amount of funding available.

Cambridge has been very successful at obtaining grant funding previously. Since September of 2021, the City has secured approximately \$49M in grant funding. These grants represent funds which would otherwise be drawn from the tax base or City reserve funds. Staff will continue their commitment to the public value of sustainability going forward, consistently finding ways to lessen the financial burden on the taxpayer while also maintaining or enhancing City service levels. With these successful funding contributions, the City is also able to further its strategic actions related to increasing housing options, providing age friendly services that are accessible to all, enhancing equity and inclusion efforts and taking action to combat climate change, among many others.

Corporate Strategy will continue to investigate opportunities to enhance the methods we use to both proactively identify funding/ grant opportunities and increase our success rates with applications. The team will also continue to monitor and track both advocacy and grant opportunities and will provide information on future activity in the form of a year-end Council Information Package (CIP) in six months' time.

Subject: Bill 17 Protect Ontario by Building Faster and Smarter Act

Comments

Bill 17 received Royal Assent on June 5, 2025, and included legislative changes to the Planning Act, Development Charges Act, Building Code Act, Building Transit Faster Act, Transit-Oriented Communities Act and Metrolinx Act. The intent of Bill 17 was to remove unnecessary barriers to building housing, transit and infrastructure, including roads in times of economic uncertainty.

This memo provides an overview of the legislative changes to the Planning Act, Development Charges Act and Building Code Act that were made to streamline municipal development processes and standardize development charges framework.

Planning Act

Streamlining Approval for Schools

1. An Official Plan or Zoning By-law can no longer restrict the location of an elementary school, a secondary school or ancillary use to such schools (e.g. a childcare centre located in the school) on any land in an Urban Area zoned for residential uses.
2. Portable classrooms located on a school site are now exempted from Site Plan Control. A site plan application is no longer required before obtaining a building permit.

The above changes are in effect.

Complete Application Study Requirements and Certified Professionals

3. The Planning Act and its regulations set out the minimum requirements for the information or studies that must be submitted with various planning applications,

including Official Plan and Zoning By-law Amendments, Plans of Subdivision, Severance and Site Plan Applications.

In addition to any provincial requirements, the City can now only require applicants to submit additional information or studies as part of a “complete” planning application if there are policies in the City’s Official Plan requiring such information and studies.

Section 10.14 of the City Official Plan, included with this memo as Schedule A, outlines the information and studies that may be required as part of a “complete” application.

This provision is currently in effect.

4. Bill 17 includes provisions that will further limit and/or prohibit certain information or studies that the municipalities can require from an applicant as part of “complete” application.

Currently, the studies that the City may no longer be able to require include sun/shadow, wind, urban design and lighting.

The list of studies will be confirmed once the Province passes the regulations under the Planning Act.

5. Municipalities will be required to accept information or studies prepared by qualified professionals for the purpose of deeming the planning application submission as “complete”.

The list of professionals will be confirmed once the Province passes the regulations under the Planning Act.

6. Official Plan Amendments proposing any policy changes to “complete” application requirements (e.g. updating the list of studies to be submitted with a planning application), will now require written approval from the provincial Minister of Municipal Affairs and Housing.

This change is currently in effect.

Setback Variances

7. New provisions have been added that will allow “as-of-right” reductions to minimum building setbacks without the need for a Minor Variance application if the setback is within a certain percentage of the required setback in the Zoning By-law.

The proposed regulations recommend a 10% variance. For example, if the current minimum front yard setback for a building to the property line is 6 metres, the “as-of-right” reduced permitted setback would be 5.4 m.

To qualify for the “as-of-right” reduced setback, the lands must be located outside of the Greenbelt area, be serviced and zoned for residential use and not be within 300 metres of a railway line or 120 metres of a wetland, shoreline, inland lake, or river or stream valley.

The above provisions are not in effect until the Province passes the regulations under the Planning Act.

Minister’s Zoning Order

8. Provisions were added under Section 37 of the Planning Act to allow the Minister to impose conditions on the use of land or the erection, location or use of buildings or structures prior to the Minister’s Zoning Order coming into effect.

In addition, the Minister will be able to enter into agreements with the landowner to enforce certain conditions. The agreement can be registered on title to the lands.

This provision is in effect.

Development Charges Act (DCA)

Bill 17 changes how development charges are applied and collected.

Changes that are currently in effect:

Exemption for long-term care homes: Development charges had previously been payable for long-term care homes in installments under section 26.1 of the DCA. Long-term care homes are now exempt from DCs.

Simplified development charge process to reduce development charges: The simplified process provides municipalities with the power to amend DC by-laws to reduce DCs without completing the typical process in limited circumstances. The power is limited to (a) eliminating indexing, or (b) otherwise reducing DCs for development as may be specified in the DC by-law amendment.

Evaluation of lowest DC rate where a rate “freeze” is applicable. Currently, DCs for developments that are subject to site plan approval, or where a zoning by-law amendment is sought, are determined based on the rates that are in effect when the development application is submitted to the municipality. This is called a rate “freeze” and allows the rate to be set earlier in the process. Typically, DCs are calculated later in the process, at building permit issuance, which is also when they are payable. As interest may be charged on the

frozen rate, the amendments to 26.2 of the DCA now require that the amount of DCs be evaluated to ensure the frozen rate plus any interest, is compared to the current rate at building permit issuance when the fees are payable. The lesser of the two values will be the amount of DCs owing.

Streamlining and standardizing the DC framework These amendments allow the Legislature to pass regulations to:

- Provide certainty regarding what constitutes eligible capital costs under subsection 5(3) of the DCA, including by limiting and or excepting eligible capital costs.
- Grouping of services for the purpose of using credits. Section 41 is amended to provide that if two or more service categories are deemed to be one service by the regulations, a credit that relates to any one of those services may be used towards a part of a development charge that relates to any of those services.
- Defining local services in the regulations. what constitutes a “local service”. Currently, municipalities are not permitted to levy development charges for local services and they may not require a developer to construct services unless they are local services. However, “local services” are not defined in the *DC Act* and this determination is made on a municipality-by-municipality basis. The intent behind prescribing a definition of “local service” is to standardize the definition across municipalities and to provide clarity as to what services are chargeable.

These related regulations have not yet been implemented.

Changes that will be in effect at a later date:

Deferral to occupancy, or early payment, of development charges for residential development: Various amendments are proposed to section 26.1 to add residential development other than rental housing development as a type of development in respect of which development charges may be paid at a time that is different than what is set out under section 26. For this type of development, development charges shall be paid at occupancy. Section 26.1 is also amended to specify that a person required to pay a development charge under that section may pay the charge before the day it is payable even in the absence of an agreement under section 27.

Removal of interest for legislated installment payments for rental and institutional developments: Section 26.2 is amended to eliminate interest on deferred payments for rental and institutional developments.

Building Code Act

The Building Code Act has been amended to provide greater clarification that municipalities do not have the authority to pass by-laws that establish construction or demolition

standards. Municipalities cannot use provisions in the Municipal Act or Planning Act, including site plan control, to create and require construction or demolition standards such as green development standards that aim to regulate building construction or demolition, such as energy efficiency. This change is to ensure a consistent province-wide standard.

Schedule A – Excerpt from Applicable City Official Plan Policies on Complete Application Requirements

10.14 Complete Application

1. In accordance with the Planning Act, the City shall require information and material, in addition to that prescribed by Provincial or Regional authority, statutes and regulations, to assist in the review of applications for Official Plan Amendments, Zoning By-law Amendments, Subdivisions and Consents. The following information will be required in order for an application to be deemed complete at the discretion of the City:

- a) a completed application form;
- b) the prescribed application fee;
- c) prescribed information and material as required under the Planning Act;
- d) a planning justification report outlining how the application is consistent with Council policy, the City's Official Plan, the Regional Official Plan the Provincial Policy Statement and any other applicable planning document or statute;
- e) concept plans and/or plan of survey;
- f) information, studies and reports as identified by the City or other agencies and described elsewhere through the Official Plan to address on and off-site matters pertaining to:
 - i) compatibility and impact on existing land use and Official Plan objectives;
 - ii) infrastructure and servicing;
 - iii) stormwater management;
 - iv) grading and drainage;
 - v) transportation, traffic and parking;
 - vi) cultural heritage;
 - vii) archaeological resources;

- viii) natural environment including vegetation management plan;
- ix) contaminated or potentially contaminated sites;
- x) soil and groundwater quality;
- xi) nuisance, noise, hazard or safety issues;
- xii) urban design;
- xiii) market impact;
- xiv) financial impacts;
- xv) active transportation assessment;
- xvi) source water protection;
- xvii) indigenous species;
- xviii) Environmental Impact Statement;
- xix) photometrics; and

g) any other matters identified through preconsultation.

2. Additional details for submission requirements are set out in the relevant sections of this Plan and/or listed on development application forms.

3. The preparation and peer review of all required studies, information and reports are at the expense of the proponent and shall be prepared by a qualified professional agreeable to the City.

At its Regular Meeting of Council held on Tuesday, June 3, 2025, the Town of Bradford West Gwillimbury Council ratified the following motion:

WHEREAS the Town of Bradford West Gwillimbury recognizes the selfless service and enduring sacrifices made by Canadian Armed Forces veterans in the defence of our country and values;

WHEREAS the 2021 Census, conducted by Statistics Canada, identified more than 460,000 veterans residing across Canada, a significant population segment deserving of comprehensive, accessible, and modernized federal support;

WHEREAS Veterans Affairs Canada (VAC) currently administers income support programs to assist veterans in need, including the Income Replacement Benefit (IRB) program;

WHEREAS the eligibility threshold for the Income Replacement Benefit (IRB) program which was created in 2019—set at \$20,000 annually for a single-person household—fails to reflect today's economic reality, particularly in light of inflation, soaring housing costs, and the general increase in cost of living;

WHEREAS such low eligibility thresholds may disincentivize employment and community participation by penalizing veterans for earning beyond an outdated benchmark, thereby discouraging reintegration and contribution to civic life;

WHEREAS it is the duty of all levels of government to stand in unified support of our veterans and to advocate for policy changes that enable them to live with dignity and financial stability;

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED That the Council of the Town of Bradford West Gwillimbury formally calls on the Government of Canada and all federal parties to increase the eligibility threshold for the Income Replacement Benefit (IRB) program from \$20,000 to no less than \$40,000 annually for a single-person household; and

THAT Council urges Veterans Affairs Canada to review all income support programs with the intent to modernize eligibility criteria in line with the current cost of living across Canada;

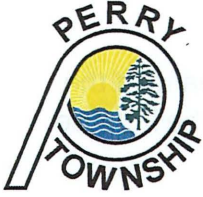

It is the duty of all levels of government to stand in unified support of our veterans and to advocate for policy changes that enable them to live with dignity and financial stability.



We respectfully encourage your governments to move forward with the increase of the eligibility threshold for the Income Replacement Benefit (IRB) and to review the income support programs available to our Canadian Veterans.

RE: Resolution Passed by Woolwich Township Council – Strong Mayor Legislation

This letter is to inform you that the Council of the Township of Woolwich passed the following resolution at their meeting held on August 26, 2025:

WHEREAS the Province of Ontario introduced Strong Mayor Powers on November 22, 2022, in the Cities of Toronto and Ottawa to support the provincial priority of building 1.5 million homes with subsequent expansions in 2023; and:

WHEREAS on May 1, 2025, the Province of Ontario expanded the Strong Mayors legislation to include 169 additional municipalities with six or more members of Council, including the Township of Woolwich; and

WHEREAS over 100 municipalities have passed resolutions opposing these powers and requesting their removal, expressing concerns about the effect on democratic governance and transparency; and

WHEREAS a 2024 survey by the Association of Municipal Managers, Clerks and Treasurers of Ontario (AMCTO) found that only 33% of mayors retained the power to change the organizational structure and 26% of mayors retained the power of employment matters; and

WHEREAS on May 1, 2025, Mayor Sandy Shantz delegated all possible political powers and duties back to Council and administrative duties back to the Chief Administrative Officer (CAO), however not all powers and duties can be delegated; and

NOW THEREFORE be it resolved that the Council of the Township of Woolwich respectfully request that the Province of Ontario continue to study the impacts of the strong mayors legislation including:

1. **To what extent the legislation is supporting the stated intent of supporting housing development, for example if strong mayors are using their powers to support or veto more housing in their communities;**
2. **If there are any unintended consequences of the legislation, for example on democracy, transparency, workplace culture, or the politicization of administrative staff appointed by a strong mayor (the CAO or department heads);**
3. **The impact of extending the legislation to smaller, rural municipalities like Woolwich, such as the impact of additional powers and duties on part-time mayors or the implications six-member councils where a simple majority and 2/3 majority vote is the same;**
4. **Consider the concerns expressed by the Association of Municipalities of Ontario (AMO) and the AMCTO, including the powers affecting public administration and eliminating the need for a majority council support for certain decisions related to provincial priorities;**
5. **Directs staff to forward this resolution to the Premier of Ontario, Minister of Municipal Affairs and Housing, AMO, AMCTO and all Municipalities in Ontario.**

On behalf of the Council of the Township of Black River-Matheson, I am writing to express our concerns regarding the mandatory firefighter certification requirements under Ontario Regulation 343/22.

At its meeting held on June 10th, Council passed the attached resolution formally opposing the implementation of these requirements. While we recognize and support the importance of firefighter training and safety, the regulation as it stands does not adequately reflect the operational realities of small, rural, and northern municipalities.

Communities such as ours rely heavily on volunteer and composite fire departments that already face critical challenges in recruitment, training accessibility, and financial capacity.

Specifically, we are burdened by:

- Geographic barriers and long travel distances to accredited training centres,
- Inconsistent access to instructors and scheduling options,
- Limited budgets and competing capital demands,
- Difficulty in retaining and replacing volunteers due to increased regulatory pressures.

Without additional support, flexibility, or exemption mechanisms, the implementation of O. Reg. 343/22 will severely compromise our ability to provide consistent, timely, and effective fire protection to our residents.

Accordingly, the Council of the Township of Black River-Matheson respectfully requests that the Office of the Fire Marshal and the Ministry of the Solicitor General:

1. Defer full implementation of the certification regulation for rural and northern municipalities,
2. Provide exemptions or alternative compliance pathways tailored to the needs and limitations of small, remote fire services,
3. Increase funding and training supports for municipalities outside major urban centres.

We believe that a one-size-fits-all regulatory model will disproportionately and unfairly affect communities like ours. A more flexible, consultative approach is urgently needed. Thank you for your consideration of this request. We would welcome further discussion and are open to participating in any future consultations or working groups aimed at resolving these challenges collaboratively.

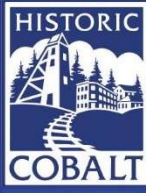
