



NOTICE OF INTENTION TO DESIGNATE City of Cambridge – Ontario Heritage Act, s.29

TAKE NOTICE that Cambridge City Council intends to designate the following properties as having cultural heritage value or interest:

- **4860 Townline Rd** – 1856 limestone mill associated with Peter Niles Holm; contributes to Black Bridge Cultural Heritage Landscape.
- **119 Wellington St** – c.1870 Gothic Revival residence linked to carriage maker James Kay.
- **210 King St E** – 19th-century commercial-residential building associated with the Werlich family.
- **70 Oak St** – Mid-19th-century fieldstone dwelling retaining original elements.
- **194 Blue Heron Ridge** – 1974 Arthur Erickson-designed modernist residence integrated with river landscape.
- **29 Roseview Ave** – 1891 Richardsonian Romanesque “Castle House” by Joseph B. Strain.
- **469 Duke St** – Queen Anne Revival residence and local landmark in Preston.
- **54 Bruce St** – c.1859 stone residence with Georgian and Romanesque influences.
- **8 Crescent Pl** – c.1910 Edwardian home associated with the Hunter family; hilltop landmark.
- **11 Cameron St** – Italianate residence associated with Thomas Little; contributes to historic streetscape.
- **154 Eagle St S** – 1900-1910 rubble stone farmhouse associated with the Fach family.
- **156 Eagle St S** – 1887 rubble stone farmhouse built by mason Peter Fach Sr.
- **234 King St E** – c.1855 Ontario Cottage linked to Xavier Fuchs and Henry Peter Bernhardt.
- **7 McAuslan Pl** – 1885 vernacular/Gothic Revival dwelling linked to builder and former Reeve Archie McAuslan.
- **135 George St N** – 1922 Canada Bread factory linked to William Dixon; associated with Dickson Park.
- **145 George St N** – 1922 Canada Bread shipping warehouse/bakery linked to William Dixon and the Grand River area.
- **35 Oak St** – Late-19th-century Queen Anne residence associated with P.W. Gardiner.
- **25 Oak St** – Late-19th-century Italianate residence associated with Joseph Sauder; part of historic East Galt context.
